6.	"Men who have lived the nearest to God have confessed the sinfulness of their nature. They have put no
	confidence in the flesh, have claimed no righteousness of their own, but have trusted wholly in the righteousness of
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	"So will it be with all who behold Christ. The nearer we come to Jesus, and the more clearly we discern the purity
	of His character, the more clearly shall we see the exceeding sinfulness of sin, and the less shall we feel like exalting

	acknowledges the Lord is His salvation—the Lord is the one who can him and save him.
9.	"As you see the enormity of sin, as you see yourself as you really are, do not give up to despair. It was sinners that
	Christ came to save. We have not to reconcile God to us, but—O wondrous love!—God in Christ is "reconciling the
	world unto Himself." 2 Corinthians 5:19. He is wooing by His tender the hearts of His erring children. No
	earthly parent could be as patient with the faults and mistakes of his children, as is God with those He seeks to save.
